FLEET REPORT – Spring 2024

Ahoy NSYC sailors! The 2024 season has begun and Launch service is running at full 'speed, with several of our launch drivers from previous years returning this year. Vic will fill in the gaps as launch driver when needed.

If your boat needs work, it is advisable to perform that work at the yard before bringing your vessel to your mooring.

Spaces on the dinghy rack are still available, so be sure to reach out to fleetcaptain@nsyc.net if you'd like to have a convenient way to launch your canoe, paddleboard, or SUP from the dock.

Thanks to all of our boat owners who have submitted your insurance certificates to fleetcaptain@nsyc.net. For those who have yet to do so, please send me your current certificate so that you can bring your boat to the mooring field.

An April storm took out the Jr. Sailing rack, so work parties were formed to get it rebuilt in time for the start of the summer program. The goal was to build something that would be sturdy enough to withstand not only the storms of the bay, but the abuse of over 30 Jr. Sailors.

On May 11, Alan Bernstein, Eric Klein, John Platz, and Roy Smitheimer assisted in part 1 of the build. Part 2 took place on May 21 when the rack was assembled by Gary Cohen, Warren Greenhouse, Mark Schneider, Captain Vic, and myself. The club now has a rack that will serve the Jr. sailing program for years to come.

BOAT SHARE

The Boat Share boats were commissioned this Spring with the help of several members. Alan Pensak, John Platz, Eric Klein, and Boat Share Co-Chair Tim Martens all pitched in to get Elusive bathed and ready to rig in early April. The mast was taken down over the winter and inspected, the boat got a new masthead fly as well as a new bottom color this year. (NSYC red!).

Jon Hokanson and new member Constantine Alexandrakis took on the commissioning duties on Under Toad, following Joe Stevens' work over the winter to facilitate getting the new mast delivered from Rhode Island. Among other things, Jon and Constantine serviced the winches and ran an electrical line below decks from the battery to the motor. A yeoman's effort as you can see! PC Lloyd Herman provided expert advice and oversaw all the details with the insurance company, the mast manufacturer, and the rigger at Safe Harbor. Peter Hirschhorn also helped communicate with the yard to keep the repairs on track. Without the work of these men, the NSYC Boat Share would once again be a single-boat

program. The rigger reports that, as of 5/30, UT is in the water with new chainplates being installed today and the rest of the rigging soon after. I anticipate UT being at her mooring within days of this writing.

THE HOLY GRAIL FOR SOLO SAILORS - IMOCA

Wednesday - February 28, 2024 @ 1930

GUEST SPEAKER: ROBERT COLES

NSYC member Robert Coles' presentation on the Vendée Globe IMOCA round-the world race was an exciting and insightful event for 30 NSYC members. Robert's background in sailing, from starting at a young age in Belgium to his passion for naval architecture and sailboat development, provided a unique perspective on the advancements and challenges faced by solo sailors participating in the IMOCA class race.

IMOCA ('International Monohull Open Class Association') manages the class of 60-foot (18.28 metres) open monohulls for the non-stop, unassisted, singlehanded, round the world race via the three capes repeated every four years.

The challenging and prestigious Vendée Globe race, is often considered the "Holy Grail" for solo sailors. Its qualification race will left New York City on May 29th after an exhibition regatta in New York Harbor on May 24th.

Of particular interest to NSYC members was the detail and skill described by Robert to manage outriggers, daggerboards, running backstays, water ballast, re-canting the keel, main sheet and traveler from cockpit controls positioned near a beanbag-like inflatable mattress.

Robert invited members to observe, and even volunteer, in the activities from the link, (https://windsupport.nyc/volunteer-opportunity/) for the qualification race in May.



A blustery spring morning, with white caps on the Sound, was the backdrop for the 2024 membership meeting, opening with the traditional Continental Breakfast.

Commodore Richard Predmore - opened the meeting with thanks to Gail and Bruce Logan for hosting the Breakfast.

- -Quorum was established and the Minutes of the October 14, 2023 meeting were approved; and members of the Bridge were introduced: Peter Hirschhorn - Rear Commodore; Yustin Koleda – Treasurer; Rob Harrison – Secretary and Evan Spence -Fleet Captain.
- -The Commodore thanked the Trustee Board Members: Karen Verola, Laura Boehm-Warnke, Mitch Litke, Jamie Ebenau and Roger Lifson, for the time and effort they put into the club.

The Commodore noted that this is our 154th season, the club is in great shape and highlighted the following:

-Make sure to pay your dues and that your insurance is up to date.

- -Launch service with Port Water Taxi to be used until the club's launches are started.
- -The club's social events are in full swing with one significant change. The club no longer sells or provides alcoholic beverages at our events. The insurance does not allow for the service of liquor without a liquor license and the complexities of a liquor license are impractical for a club of our size. A BYOB policy is under discussion but you will need to take the liquor with you when you leave the club. With children around, alcohol in the refrigerators may be a problem. Members will be informed when a policy is finalized.
